It's a free program that accepts any brand of computers and equipment in any condition. Since December 2011, we've collected more than 420,000 pounds of electronic waste and shipped it to Dell for recycling!

Each year we pause to reflect on the many activities that our organization has accomplished over the past year and to share in the successes of the many men and women that we serve. This past year is no different. Ohio Valley Goodwill has achieved many great accomplishments, and we are happy to outline some of these in this report.

During the past year, Ohio Valley Goodwill served 3,153 individuals with disabilities and homeless veterans and was able to place 818 men and women into competitive community employment. Last year, we also assisted more than 650 veterans in their search for housing, jobs, vocational training, and support services. Our staff continues to be committed and dedicated to the mission of the organization and throughout the past year have been acknowledged for their efforts through distinguished awards and recognition.

Thanks to a giving community, we continue to receive donations of clothing, household goods and even vehicles which help us to offer the many programs and services that Ohio Valley Goodwill is able to make available to the thousands of individuals that we serve. Over the past year, we have received donations of more than 44 million pounds of textiles and household goods that are sold in our stores. This helps to make available over 60% of the income needed to provide the programs and services for the people that we work with each year!

Rehabilitation Services

Served over 3100 individuals in 2011 Placed over 800 in competitive employment in 2011

The Rehabilitation Employment and Training division of Ohio Valley Goodwill Industries offers a wide array of services for men and women with disabilities and for others with barriers to employment. These services include Work Evaluation, Occupational Skills Training, Work Adjustment Training, Placement Services, Job Coaching Support, Recreational Coaching, and Ability One Program offerings. Funding for these programs are primarily provided by County Boards of Developmental Disabilities in Hamilton, Butler, Clermont and Warren Counties and the Ohio Rehabilitation Services Commission. Ohio Valley Goodwill also offers a number of services and support programs for homeless individuals, including veterans. Funding for these programs is provided through a variety of grants from the United States Department of Labor, HUD, and the Veterans Administration.

Ohio Valley Goodwill is proud of the quality programs and services it provides for the men and women it serves each year. Last year (2011), Goodwill served a total of 3,153 individuals and placed 818 men and women into competitive community employment. Contributed Goods

Recycled more than 43 million pounds in 2011


Helping to provide the support for the programs and services of Ohio Valley Goodwill is a primary goal for the Contributed Goods division. Donations from the community and retail store sales provide over 60% of the income required to support the programs and services designed to meet the needs of the individuals that organization serves. Individuals with disabilities are helped in many ways and are provided with the opportunity to learn life skills and gain vocational preparation. Our community has continued to respond to the needs of the organization for over 95 years, and we appreciate their efforts.

Last year, over 671,000 donors contributed to Ohio Valley Goodwill and 1,277,140 customers visited our 16 tri-state retail stores. In addition, we received more than 12 million pounds of donated textiles and in excess of 30 million pounds of additional household goods which helps to make Ohio Valley Goodwill one of the largest recyclers in the Greater Cincinnati area. Putting people to work is Goodwill's first and foremost mission and by doing so we help to save more than 7.7 million dollars in governmental assistance and provide 66 million dollars in economic impact to the local economy.

An additional part of the Contributed Goods division is the successful Auto Auction program. One of the largest Goodwill vehicle operations among all such programs throughout the country, the department received a total of 1,599 vehicles during the past year with average revenue of \$1,076.87 per vehicle. The department collected a total revenue of \$1,707,910 during 2011. No vehicles were scrapped; every vehicle was sold at our in-house auction, again contributing to the overall recycling process.

Ohio Valley Goodwill thanks the Greater Cincinnati community for its continued support. Donations are always accepted at any of our Attended Donation Centers and retail stores. Every donation helps to support our very important mission of putting people to work!

Industrial Services

Worked with over 100 business partners over the past year.

Ohio Valley Goodwill's Industrial Services division helps the organization with its mission to put people to work. The division has worked with local and regional business and industry for many years and has offered them a way to lower their labor expenses, streamline their operations, and increase their output. This is accomplished in a variety of ways either through completing work at Goodwill's multiple facilities or through opportunities at the customer's own location. At Goodwill, the contract services department offers workers a variety of work options including packaging, assembly work, inspecting, shrink wrapping, labeling, mailing and other projects and services. Outside of the building, Goodwill's work crews perform a wide variety of work options including janitorial services and on-site work supervised by Goodwill staff. Goodwill can respond quickly, accurately, and in a timely fashion to satisfy the business owner's orders and turnaround times.

During the past year, the Industrial Services division has developed new relationships with businesses and maintained partnerships with local companies that have assisted with work assignments and labor for the people that Ohio Valley Goodwill serves. Goodwill appreciates the cooperation that it receives from local business and industry as it helps to make real work experiences available for the people that the organization serves. Companies can benefit from the capabilities, flexibility, and the considerable size of the work force that Goodwill offers to area businesses. Working with Goodwill's Industrial Services division helps the local business community by supplementing a variety of different operations and offering excellent customer service, while at the same time creating jobs for men and women with disabilities.




